

CAREER CONNECTIONS is a joint venture between Grant Wood AEA, community agencies, and local school districts. The community providers of employment specialist services are Advancement Services of Jones County, Goodwill of the Heartland, Optima LifeServices, Rural Employment Alternatives, Inc., and the University of Iowa Center for Disabilities and Development.

- Tours of their business operations
- Short term job shadows where students get to see the business in action
- Internships where students develop valuable skills
- Informational interviews where students gain important industry information
- Hire qualified students
- Referrals to other businesses.

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CAREER CONNECTIONS is a program that helps high school students identify a career goal and find, learn, and keep a job. Career Connections achieves these outcomes through career counseling, job shadows, time limited skills instruction, internships, and job coaching during an additional or fifth year of high school. The Career Connections program is part of an evolving system of post-secondary services and supports designed to meet the diversity of needs of high school students with disabilities to ensure that they become productive members of the Iowa workforce.

Career Connections serves students with disabilities who:

1. Have an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) with transition goals for competitive employment after high school;
2. Are likely to need short-term (6-12 months), community based, on-the-job training to achieve their career goal;
3. Have demonstrated the ability to learn multi-step tasks through short term modeling, demonstration, and verbal directions;
4. Want to work in the community and will accept assistance in identifying a career goal and finding, learning, and keeping a job.

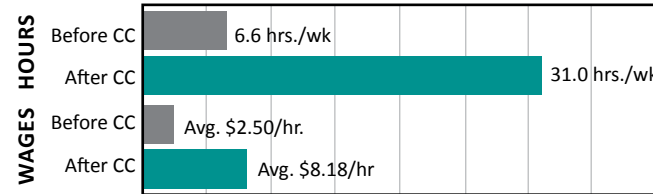

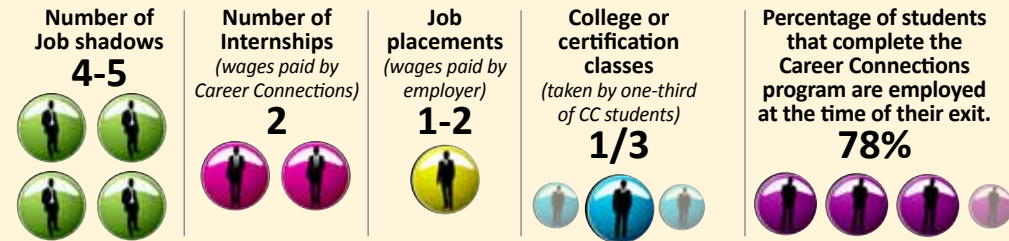

Resume building activities (average per student)

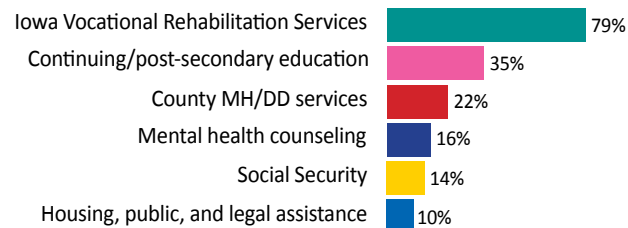


Successful completion of IEP goals

Students participating in Career Connections typically have goals in the areas of **work exploration** and **self-advocacy**, **job finding** and **interview skills**, and **work performance skills**. Students may have additional goals in such areas as **social skills** or **community transportation** depending on their individual needs. In 2009-10, students participating in Career Connections **met 71% of their IEP goals**. For those goals not met, most students showed improvement in the skill area.
